Hegewisch , Ariane, and Hannah Liepmann. "The Gender Wage Gap by Occupation." *IWPR.org*. April 2010. Web. 5 Nov. 2010. <<http://www.iwpr.org/pdf/C350a.pdf>>

In compiling 2009 data from the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics, the writers show that women earn less than men in almost all occupations. The gender wage ratio for median weekly earnings for female full time workers was 80.2 per cent; this is a gender wage gap of 19.8 percent. The report also concludes that occupational gender segregation is "a significant feature of the US labor market" (6).

Heilman, Madeline E., et al. "[Penalties for Success: Reactions to Women Who Succeed at Male Gender-Typed Tasks](#)." *Journal of Applied Psychology* 89.3 (2004): 416-427. *PsycINFO* and *Business Source Premier*. Web. 5 Nov. 2010.

The writers conducted 3 studies examining the reactions to a woman's success in a job traditionally held by a man. Results demonstrated that successful women tend to be belittled compared to equally successful men; that the disparaging reactions take place only when the success is in a distinctly male field; and that the dislike for successful women can have negative career-affecting outcomes. The studies support the idea that gender stereotypes distort judgments of women in the workplace, even when women have proven themselves successful.

Nye, Naomi Shihab. "To Any Would-Be Terrorists?" *Seventy-five Readings: An Anthology*. Ed. Santi Buscemi. Boston: McGraw-Hill, 2009. 363-368. Print.

Nye, whose father is Palestinian, responds to the problem of terrorism by addressing four points in Arab-American relations: 1) unjust policies of the U. S. government concerning Israel and Palestine; 2) the importance of religious tolerance and the peaceful nature of most Muslims; 3) the hatred most Americans have for violence and the media's portrayal of violence; 4) the need for both Arabs and Americans to tell of their suffering, to read each other's poetry and to find common ground.

Scott, Charity. "Belief in a Just World: A Case Study in Public Health Ethics." *Hastings Center Report* 38.1 (2008): 16-19. *Academic Search Premier*. Web. 4 Nov. 2010.

The writer analyzes public opinion about people's worthiness for public assistance. The public reacted negatively to the profile of a qualifying family in *The Atlanta Journal-Constitution*, but responded positively in telephone interviews conducted by the National Center for Children in Poverty. The positive reactions were to general questions about support for health insurance for children in low-income families.
